PATHWAYS TO HEALING HOPE FAMILY HEALTH

Vickie Phillips was ready to end her life in 2005. But the thought of her two daughters stopped her.

"I wondered, 'Who would take care of them? Who would be there for them?'" she recalls. "I realized I had to keep trying."

She turned to Jenny Dittes, a certified physician assistant who had treated Vickie for many years. Jenny had just opened HOPE Family Health, a faith-based nonprofit health center that provides affordable medical and mental health care to all, regardless of insurance status and ability to pay.

Vickie was treated for several chronic diseases and has been with HOPE ever since, receiving ongoing support to stay healthy. She has lost 138 pounds, has quit smoking and is now a grandmother.

"I have hope for the future because I've gotten healthier. I love all my grandkids so much. I'm glad I am still here and can be a part of their lives."

The Memorial Foundation grant supports the salary of HOPE Family Health's Bilingual Patient Navigator, who serves 550 Limited English Proficient patients through 1,000 medical or behavioral visits.

PATHWAYS TO OPPORTUNITY MCNEILLY CENTER FOR CHILDREN

Sharonda was only 17 when her daughter Haily was born in 1998, but wouldn't give up on her dream of a high school diploma.

She enrolled Haily in McNeilly Center for Children and continued pursuing her education. McNeilly, one of the largest childcare providers for low-income families in Middle Tennessee, is a stellar center that assesses fees on a sliding scale based on income. While Haily was safe at daycare, Sharonda got her diploma, took Early Education courses, and worked to make ends meet.



Haily went on to excel in school and earned a full scholarship to Belmont University, where she is currently studying Business Management with a minor in Social Economics. Sharonda not only received her Early Education credentials but was hired as a teacher at McNeilly, where she has worked for 17 years. McNeilly has enabled her financial independence and allowed her to give back. In addition to being an educator, Sharonda also is a custodial guardian for young children in need.

The Memorial Foundation grant provides general program support that enables McNeilly Center to serve approximately 370 children in two East Nashville locations.

PATHWAYS TO FREEDOM PROJECT RETURN

Tracy Biggers spent six years in a Tennessee penitentiary and was ready to start over. He knew just who could help him get on the right path - Project Return.

Project Return helps people find employment and build full and free lives after incarceration.

Tracy learned about the organization while in prison through its in-reach efforts. He met with staff members to learn about Project Return's opportunities. When he was released in 2016, he enrolled in Project Return's Job Readiness classes.

"They stood by me all the way," he says. "Everything they did put me on the road to achieve everything that I have."

Through PROe, one of Project Return's social enterprises, Tracy became a transitional employee at a manufacturing company.

Once he had his footing, he enrolled in Project Return's Reentry Entrepreneurship Program and pitched an idea for a commercial cleaning company. That company, called Queen Bee, was awarded seed funding and is a thriving business today. Tracy and his wife now also run a catering company, and he continues to work at the manufacturing company, where he is now a supervisor.

With Project Return's resources, Tracy continues to find new ways to thrive as a free man.

The Memorial Foundation grant supports Project Return's PRO Employment (PROe), which creates jobs and offers recently-released individuals immediate and stable, transitional employment.



PATHWAYS TO REBIRTH NASHVILLE RESCUE MISSION

At only 15, Jay was charged with three counts each of attempted murder and illegally discharging firearms. Facing a lifetime in prison, he was ready for change.

"I remember telling God I was ready to surrender.

I didn't want to live the rest of my life [there]."

Thanks to support from a counselor with Christian Counseling Services, Jay was released in 2007 after three years, contingent on completing the Rescue Mission's Life Recovery Program, which helps men and women understand the reasons they struggle with addiction, homelessness, and other damaging lifestyles. It shows them the path they need to take to rebuild their lives.

"This experience saved my life," he said. Jay went on to attend Middle Tennessee State University, get married and become a father. He now works for organizations that support the local community, giving back to groups like those that gave him a second chance at life.

The Memorial Foundation grant enables Nashville Rescue Mission to provide to men, women and children the following free services: emergency shelter, food, clothing, long-term recovery, adult education, career development training, transitional living and Travelers Aid.


